Dear Justice Gammage,

I wish to request an amendment to the grant budget for the Office of the Provost for Judicial Education. This amendment would authorized the expenditure of an amount of approximately \$30,000 for the services of the State Law Library in assisting the Provost in the acquisition, processing, and storage of materials on judicial education. Funds for these purposes are available in the remaining grant funds. In performing my work this past year, the urgent need for such a resource center has become clear. At the conclusion of my grant, the materials will remain in the State Law Library and will form the beginning of a permanent Judicial Education Collection.

Judges and Court Personnel who agree to serve as faculty members for training and education programs will use these resources. The judicial education centers will use the collection in planning their curriculum and courses and in preparing materials. The collection will also serve scholars in their research and writing about this important subject.

If the Court approves this request, it is my intent to appoint Kay Schlueter, the State Law Librarian, as a consultant, and to authorize an expenditure of approximately \$30,000 out of the grant which the Supreme Court has made to the University of Texas at Austin for the purposes stated above.

I am also pleased to report that I was successful in retaining the services of Dr. Betty Sue Flowers, a humanist scholar, and Mike Widner, an archivist, to assist me in organizing and summarizing my year's work product so that it will be available for future use. The materials that I have received and produced will be delivered to the Court with my final report.
