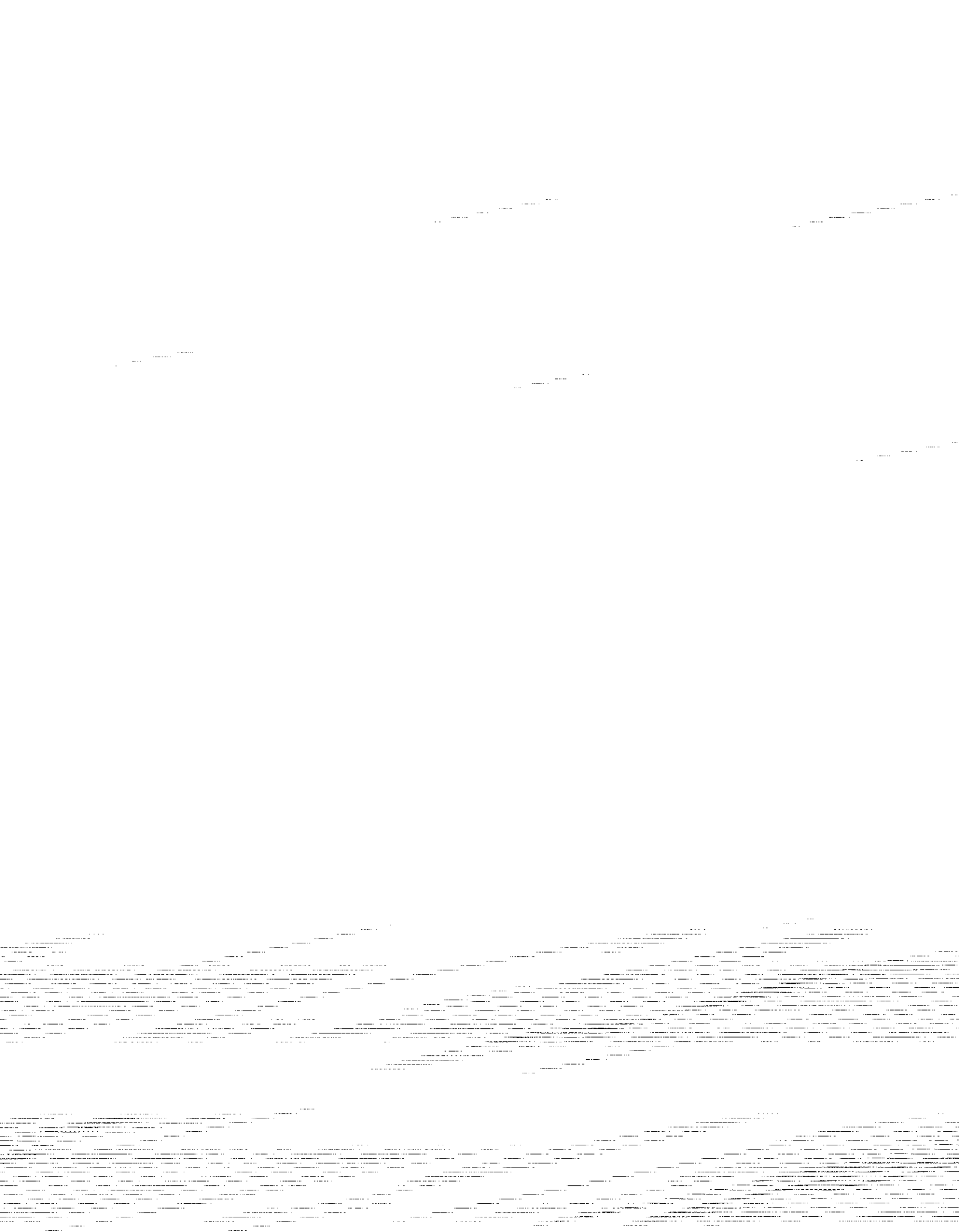

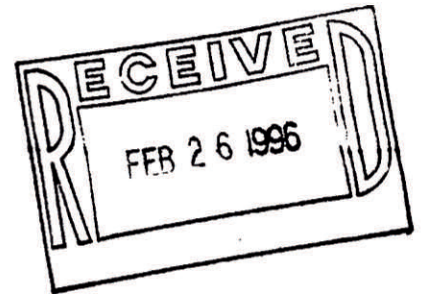

RE: Voluntary Resignation from the State Bar of Texas

Dear Mr. Burg:

The Supreme Court of Texas requires all members wishing to voluntarily resign from the State Bar of Texas to submit a **sworn** affidavit stating:

"I (the resigning member) have surrendered all Bar Cards, all Law Licenses, and all certificates issued to me by the Supreme Court of Texas;"

This requirement is in addition to the **notarized** affidavit to be submitted by the resigning member pursuant to Article III, Section 6(A) of the State Bar Rules stating that the purpose in resigning is not to avoid disciplinary action and that there is no knowledge of any unresolved allegations of professional misconduct.

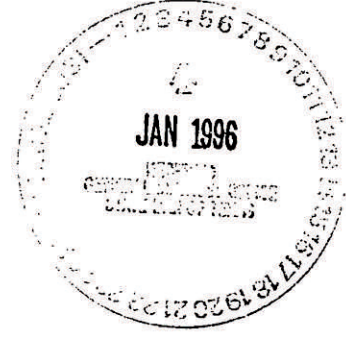
Please be advised that until such time as you comply with the requirements set forth herein you will continue to be shown on the membership rolls as an active member who must comply with the payment of Bar dues and the performance of continuing legal education mandated by the State Bar Act. This means that you would be subject to administrative suspension for any subsequent failure to pay Bar dues and/or failure to perform minimum continuing legal education.

If you are currently on the inactive rolls, you do not have to comply with the continuing legal education requirements; however, you are required to pay \$50 annually to remain in good standing.

I hereby certify that my purpose in resigning my bar license is not to avoid disciplinary action and that I have no knowledge of any unresolved allegation of professional misconduct against me.

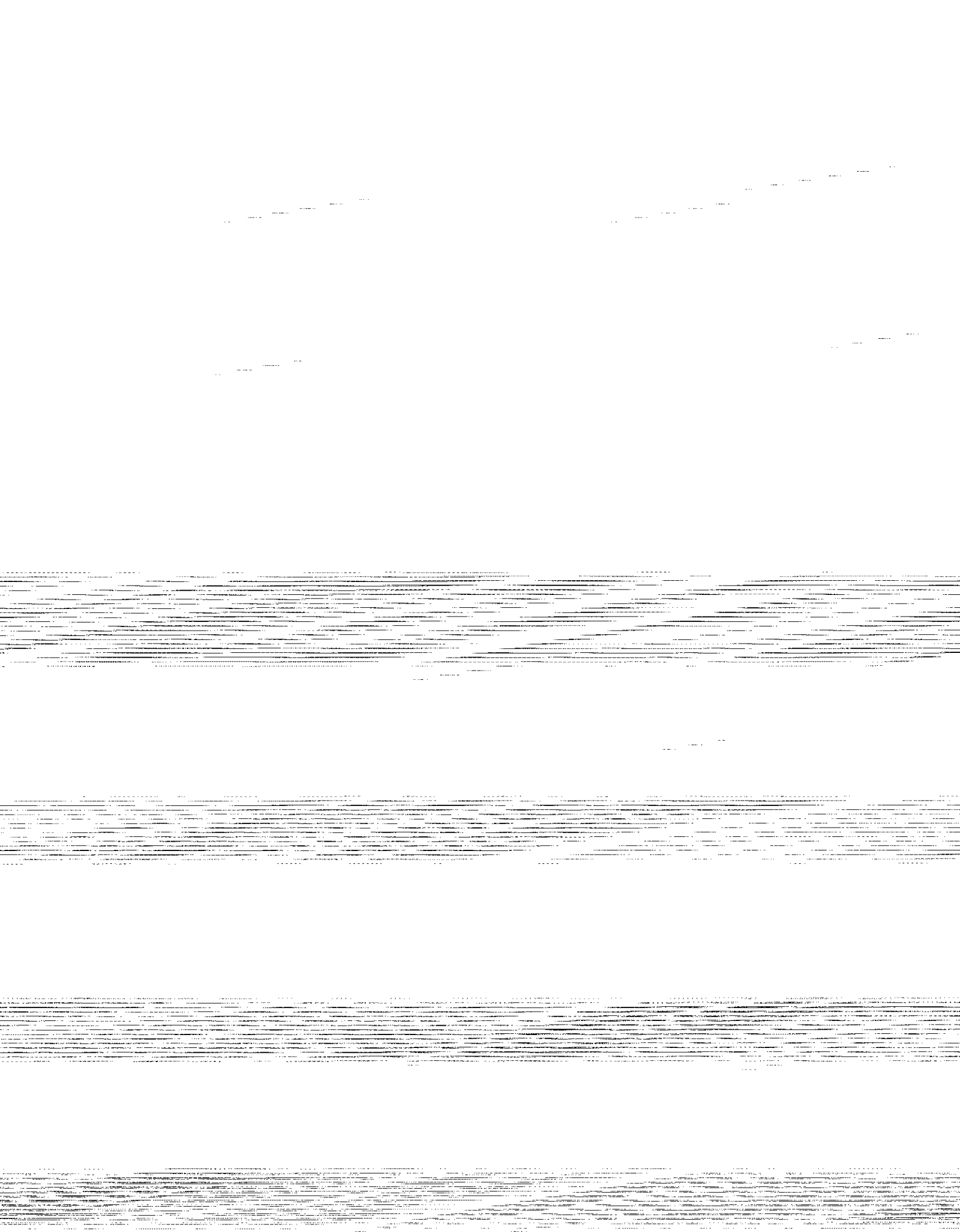
