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Interim Charge 3:

Study and make recommendations on the feasibility of removing failure to attend school (Section 25.094, Texas Education Code) as a Class C misdemeanor offense and determine the feasibility of adjudicating juvenile truancy as a civil offense.

Failure to Attend School

- 1. 12 years or older, under 18
- 2. Required to attend school under Section 25.085 of the Education Code
- 3. Fail to attend school on 10 or more days or parts of days in a six month period during the same school year; or three or more days or parts of days within a four week period
 - The burden is on the defendant to show by a preponderance of the evidence that the absence has been excused or that the absence was involuntary
- 4. Is a Class C misdemeanor
- 5. Can be prosecuted in Constitutional County Court in counties with a population above 1.75 million, in all other areas prosecuted in a justice court or municipal court
