COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS

The Court of Criminal Appeals is the highest state court for criminal appeals and is composed of a Presiding Judge, four judges and two permanent commissioners. In addition, pursuant to Article 1811e, V.A.T.S., five special commissioners served the court at various times during the year. The special commissioners included two retired judges who assisted throughout the year and three justices from the courts of civil appeals.

The Court of Criminal Appeals faced another record caseload in 1976. The 2,458 new cases docketed in the Court represent a 32 percent increase over the 1,863 cases docketed in 1975 and were 43 percent higher than the ten-year average of 1,393.

A total of 1,156 applications for writs of habeas corpus and mandamus were filed during 1976. One thousand ninety-two such matters were disposed of in 1976, an increase of 30 percent over the 1975 total of 839 and 47 percent higher than the ten-year average.

In 1976, the Court of Criminal Appeals disposed of 67 percent of the cases docketed during the year or carried over from 1975, compared to 71 percent the previous year. Seventy-five percent were disposed of by per curiam opinions, compared to 76 percent in 1975.

Two thousand one hundred seventy-seven opinions (including dissents and concurrences) were written in 1976, 16 percent more than the 1975 total of 1,869. Twenty-six percent of these were authored opinions.


The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the trial court's decision in 78 percent of the cases reviewed and dismissed or abated the appeal in an additional 13 percent.

One thousand seventy-five docketed cases were pending at the end of 1976 — 54 percent higher than a year earlier and 97 percent higher than the tenyear average of 546.

Based on the service of five judges and four fulltime commissioners, the caseload per judge in the Court of Criminal Appeals was higher than that of the other appellate courts. The number of cases filed per judge or commissioner increased to 273 in 1976 from 207 in 1975.

The intermediate state appellate courts in Texas do not have criminal jurisdiction. As a result, appeals in criminal cases are directly to the Court of Criminal Appeals from the district and county courts. Due to the absence of an intermediate appellate court system for criminal cases, the Court of Criminal Appeals hears cases which in other states would be heard by one or more intermediate courts.

The Court of Criminal Appeals is also burdened by the provision of Article 44.24 of the Code of Criminal Procedure which requires the Court to deliver a written opinion or certificate with citation of supporting authorities in each case it decides. This rule resulted in the five judges and four commissioners of the Court writing an average of 242 opinions each during 1976. In 1975, the average was 208.
