COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS 1978

The Court of Criminal Appeals is the highest State court for criminal appeals and is composed of a Presiding Judge and eight judges. In addition, pursuant to Article 1811e, V.T.C.S., four special commissioners served the Court at various times during the year.

The recent trend of greatly increased filings slackened somewhat in 1978. The 3,104 new cases docketed in the Court were five percent less than the 3,267 cases docketed during 1977, but were still 67 percent higher than the tenvear average of 1,854.

A total of 1,734 applications for writs of habeas corpus and mandamus were filed during 1978. One thousand five hundred forty-two matters were disposed of in 1978, an increase of 13 percent over the 1977 total of 1,361 and 70 percent higher than the ten-year average.

An amendment to Article 40.09, sec. 16, C.C.P., effective May 25, 1977, gave the Court exclusive power to grant extentions of time for the filing of transcriptions of court reporters' notes, bills of exception and briefs in criminal cases. The Court heard and disposed of 2,434 such applications, compared to 1,887 during the last seven months of 1977.

In 1978, the Court of Criminal Appeals disposed of 51 percent of the cases docketed during the year or carried over from 1977, compared to 57 percent the previous year. Eighty-four percent were disposed of by per curiam opinions, compared to 82 percent in 1977.

Two thousand eight hundred seventy-eight opinions (including dissents and concurrences) were written in 1978, four percent more than the 1977 total of 2,778. Twenty-four percent of these were authored opinions.


The Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the trial court's decision in 77 percent of the cases reviewed and dismissed or abated the appeal in an additional 12 percent.

Two thousand five hundred seven docketed cases were pending at the end of 1978 — 32 percent higher than a year earlier and 165 percent higher than the ten-year average of 947.

Based on the service of nine judges, the caseload per judge in the Court of Criminal Appeals remained higher than that of the other appellate courts. The number of cases filed per judge or commissioner decreased slightly to 345 in 1978 from 363 in 1977.

The intermediate State appellate courts in Texas do not have criminal jurisdiction. As a result, appeals in criminal cases are directly to the Court of Criminal Appeals from the district and county courts. Due to the absence of an intermediate appellate court system for criminal cases, the Court of Criminal Appeals hears cases which in other states would be heard by one or more intermediate courts.

The Court of Criminal Appeals is also burdened by the provision of Article 44.24 of the Code of Criminal Procedure which requires the Court to deliver a written opinion or certificate with citation of supporting authorities in each case it decides. This rule resulted in the nine judges of the Court writing an average of 316 opinions each during 1978. In 1977, the average was 308.
