## COURTS OF CIVIL APPEALS

The Courts of Civil Appeals reversed, at least in part, the decision of the trial court in 27 per cent of the cases disposed.

At the end of 1974, 673 cases remained on the Courts of Civil Appeals dockets for disposition in a later year, a 24 per cent increase over the previous year. The number of cases pending at the end of 1974 was 13 per cent higher than the ten-year average. Of the 673 cases pending December 31, 1974, 104 had been on the docket six to twelve months and 5 had been pending more than a year.

Sixty-eight cases were pending on the docket of the Fourteenth Court in Houston at the close of the year. The number for the other courts ranged down to 23 at Tyler. The average number pending for all courts was 48, up from 35 at the end of 1973.

The average lapse between the filing of a case in a Court of Civil Appeals and its disposition ranged from 2.5 months in the Waco Court to 6.2 months in the Austin Court. The average for all courts was 4.8 months, a few days longer than the average in 1973. The average disposition time was shorter than in 1973 in nine of the courts.

While the 14 Courts of Civil Appeals operate to a large extent as autonomous courts in specific geographic areas, some highly desirable aspects of unification are achieved by periodic transfers of cases among the courts by order of the Supreme Court pursuant to Article 1738, V.A.T.S. The Supreme Court transferred 60 per cent more cases in 1974 than in 1973.

The Dallas Court received the most attention from these transfers: of the 218 cases transferred to other courts (disregarding transfers between the two Houston Courts), 162 were transferred from the Dallas Court. The Waco Court received the most transferred cases—64.


The net result of these transfers for the years 1970-1974 is shown in Figure 4. The workload of the courts after the transfers were made is shown by the total bar above the center line. This workload ranged from 305 cases at Texarkana to 810 in the First Court at Houston, a range considerably narrower than the range of filings (246 at Eastland and Tyler to 1,124 at Dallas) over the same five years. The average workload for all courts during this period was 483 cases.

The 14 Courts of Civil Appeals exercise intermediate appellate jurisdiction in civil cases. Each court has geographic jurisdiction in a Supreme Judicial District.

Each of the courts has three justices, for a total of 42 intermediate appellate justices in the state.

Cases filed in all the Courts of Civil Appeals during 1974 increased 13 per cent over 1973 and were 18 per cent higher than the ten-year average. New cases filed in three of the courts in 1974 (Houston First, San Antonio and Texarkana) were less than the number filed in 1973. Of the eleven courts with increased filings, the Eastland Court experienced the largest percentage increase—170 per cent (39 cases)—and the Dallas Court the largest increase in actual number of filings—51. The Dallas Court continued to receive more new filings than any of the other courts—258 compared with the average of 107. (Figure 5) The two courts in Houston, each of which have jurisdiction over the same geographic area, received a total of 331 new cases, one less than in 1973.

Figure 3. COURTS OF CIVIL APPEALS Cases filed, disposed and pending 1965-1974





In 1974, all the Courts of Civil Appeals disposed of 68 per cent of the cases filed during the year or carried over from 1973, a decrease of 5 per cent. The 1,383 dispositions were 8 per cent higher than the ten-year average of 1,282. The First and Fourteenth Courts in Houston had the highest number of dispositions, 164 and 165 respectively, compared with the average for the 14 courts of 100. Seven of the courts increased the number of dispositions in 1974 over the number disposed of in 1973.

In 1974, a total of 1,315 opinions were written by

the Courts of Civil Appeals, compared to 1,313 in 1973. The First Court at Houston wrote the largest number of opinions, 141, compared with the average per court of 94.

The average number of written opinions per judge for all Courts of Civil Appeals was 31, the same as in 1973.

Cases filed, disposed and pending 1974





Figure 6. APPELLATE COURTS Average number of cases filed per justice 1965-1974
