Analysis of Activity for the Year Ending August 31, 1985

The Supreme Court of Texas is the highest state court for civil appeals and promulgates rules of administration and civil procedure for the courts of Texas. It is comprised of the Chief Justice and eight justices.

By any measure of workload, the Supreme Court had its busiest year of record during state fiscal year 1985 which ended August 31, 1985. It wrote more opinions, added more regular causes, applications for writs of error and other writs and motions to its dockets, and disposed of more matters than during any previous 12-month period.

The Court "passed on" (disposed of or otherwise acted upon) a total of 1,920 matters during fiscal 1985, an increase of 18.1% over the 1,626 matters passed on in fiscal 1984 and 19.8% more than the 10-year average of 1,602.

Regular Causes

The 178 regular causes added to the Court's docket were 89.4% more than the 94 regular causes added in fiscal 1984 and 48.3% more than the 10-year average of 120.

The 160 regular causes disposed of were 42.9% more than the 112 disposed of in fiscal 1984 and 35.6% more than the 10-year average of 118. One hundred forty-one of the regular causes disposed of during 1985 came to the Court on application for writ of error from one of the 14 Courts of Appeals. Of those 141 dispositions, the lower courts were reversed in whole or in part in 108 or 76.6%. This compares to 75.7% reversals in fiscal 1984.

The 51 regular causes left pending at the end of fiscal 1985 represented 24.2% of the total number of regular causes added during the year or carried over from the previous year. This is lower than the 10-year average of 27.2%. At the end of fiscal 1984, 33 regular causes had been pending in the Court.

Applications for Writs of Error

The 998 applications for writs of error filed during fiscal 1985 represented a 1.1% increase over the 987 applications filed in fiscal 1984,

and was 20% more than the 10-year average of 832.

The 1,018 applications for writs of error disposed of during the year was 15% more than the 885 disposed of during fiscal 1984, and a 24.9% increase over the 10-year average of 815. Of those 1,018 applications disposed of, 141 or 13.9% were granted.

The 288 applications for writs of error left pending at the end of fiscal 1985 represented 22.1% of the total number of such applications filed during the year or carried over from the previous year. This compares to a 10-year average of 19.1%. At the end of fiscal 1984, 308 applications for writs of error had been pending in the Court.

Other Writs and Motions

The 751 other writs and motions filed during fiscal 1985 were 16.8% more than the 643 filed during fiscal 1984, and 11.8% more than the 10-year average of 672.

The 742 other writs and motions disposed of during fiscal 1985 were 18% more than the 629 disposed during fiscal 1984, and 10.7% more than the 10-year average of 670.


The 104 other writs and motions left pending by the Court at the end of fiscal 1985 represented 12.3% of the total number of other writs and motions filed during the year or carried over from the previous year. This compares to a 10-year average of 8.5%. At the end of fiscal 1984, 95 other writs and motions had been pending in the Court.

Opinions Written

During fiscal year 1985, the justices of the Supreme Court wrote 217 opinions (or an average of 24.1 opinions each), 40.9% more than the 154 opinions written in fiscal 1984 and 34% more than the 10-year average of 162. Of the opinions written in 1985, 153 (or 70.5%) were deciding opinions which disposed of causes.

During fiscal 1985, the Supreme Court heard oral argument of 103 causes and considered an additional 48 causes submitted on briefs.

[&]quot;Negular Causes" are reported in a separate category because they are the cases which pass through most, if not all, of the steps of the regular appellate decision-making process, legular causes are cases in which oral argument of counsel in open court is received (unless waived) and in which the Court's decision is usually reported in a written opinion. Most are reviewed in conference by the Supreme Court, before oral argument and decision, upon application for writ of error, with three or more of the justices voting that the decision of the Court of Appeals was erroneous and that the writ therefore should be granted. A similar procedure is followed regarding petitions for original mandamus and habeas corpus, which become "Regular Causes" only after review and vota in conference. "Cases Other Than Hegular Causes" include such actions as the Court's rejection in conference of an application for writ of error or application to file a petition for original mandamus or habeas corpus. This category is obviously larger than that of regular causes.
