Dear Mr. Gambles,

As a result of a recent audit of the Commission's files, I am writing to ensure that you are aware of the outcome of your case. The Commission voted unanimously at its January 10, 2014 meeting to dismiss the referenced complaint.

<u>MOTION AND VOTE</u>: Barnard moved to dismiss the complaint because it falls outside the Commission's jurisdiction and direct staff to provide the Innocence Project of Texas with a copy of the corresponding laboratory report to determine if additional legal remedies are available to the complainant. Lerma seconded the motion. The FSC unanimously adopted the motion.

The complaint alleged problems with the handling of evidence prior to its arrival at the crime laboratory, but did not articulate any negligence or misconduct in the forensic analysis itself.
