At its April 10, 2015 meeting, the Texas Forensic Science Commission reviewed your correspondence and voted to dismiss your complaint because it does not allege any negligence or misconduct over which the Commission has jurisdiction. You complain that Orchid Cellmark did not test all of the items you believe should have been tested in your case. The question of whether sufficient DNA testing was performed on items of evidence is not a question the Commission can resolve. The issue of which items should or should not be tested in a given criminal case is within the sole discretion of the court system.

We encourage you to contact an attorney regarding your questions about items that were not tested by the laboratory, so they may determine whether Texas law entitles you to any further testing of evidence. Following is a list of innocence clinics in Texas:
