Re: TFSC Laboratory Disclosure No. 19.43 Bexar Co. CIL (Martinez Podcast)

Dear Mr. Martinez:

On January 31, 2020, the Texas Forensic Science Commission ("Commission") voted to take no further action with respect to the referenced disclosure by your employer, the Bexar County Criminal Investigation Laboratory ("BCCIL").

The disclosure described BCCIL management's concerns regarding your participation in a podcast involving the death of a young man in Mississippi and related local law enforcement investigations. The matter did not relate to any Texas criminal action.

The Commission is charged by the Texas Legislature with improving the integrity and reliability of forensic analysis and related testimony in Texas criminal actions. The term "criminal action" is defined broadly to include "an investigation, complaint, arrest, bail, bond, trial, appeal, punishment or other matter related to conduct proscribed by a criminal offense." Tex. Code Crim. Proc. art. 38.35.

The licensing program developed by the Commission includes a Code of Professional Responsibility which sets forth the professional standards expected of Texas analysts. 37 Tex. Admin. Code §651.219 (2018) (Tex. Forensic Sci. Comm., Code of Professional Responsibility). Forensic analysts hold a special position of trust within the criminal justice system. For this reason, it is crucial that all analysts refrain from exceeding their areas of expertise and respect the limitations of the scientific disciplines in which they are trained.

The Commission expects all analysts to abide by the principles set forth in the Texas Code as well as in all other applicable codes of conduct. We trust that you understand the importance of these guiding principles and will consider them carefully in future endeavors.
