UPDATE ON JUDICIAL SALARIES

JULY 2024



OFFICE OF COURT ADMINISTRATION

The Commission shall consider the following factors in recommending proper salaries:

1. Skill and experience required of the judgeship

2. Value of compensable service performed in comparison to judicial compensation in other states and the federal government

3. Value of comparable service performed in the private sector, including private judging, arbitration, and mediation

4. Compensation of attorneys in the private sector

5. Cost of living and changes in the cost of living

6. Compensation of other public officials in the state

7. Other factors normally or traditionally considered in determining judicial compensation

8. Most importantly, level of overall compensation adequate to attract the most highly qualified individuals to serve without unreasonable economic hardship and with judicial independence unaffected by financial concerns



The Office of Court Administration shall produce a report that must include:

- 1. The rate at which state judges resign from office or do not seek reelection
- 2. The reason for action

3. Whether the compensation of state judges exceeds, is equal to, or is less than the compensation of judges at corresponding levels in the 5 states closest in population to this state

4. Whether the compensation of state judges exceeds, is equal to, or is less than the average salary of lawyers engaged in the private practice of law






















Since the base pay was last raised in Texas 10 years ago, judges in every other state except for Nevada have received increases in salary.




The current **base district** and **courts of appeals salaries** fall below the average salary of a Texas lawyer in 2022. All other judicial salaries fall below the average salary of an experienced lawyer in the state, defined as the wages earned by the upper 2/3 of all workers in the occupation.



In FY 18, the state salary of a district judge fell below the compensation levels from 1991 when factoring in inflation. The salary needed in FY 2024 to keep with inflation is \$175,641, which would require an increase of 25%.
