What about cases assigned from district to county court at law?	Cases assigned from district court to county court at law should always have been reported as a transfer under All Other Dispositions on the district court and as an All Other Case Added on the County Court at Law reports. We have been finding out that this has not been happening in some counties.
So in grand jury for our county we assign cases to different courts . would that be considered a transfer?	If it transfers, yes.
I have 2 district judges, we do not assign cases to a certain judge. These judges have continuing jurisdiction and hear each other cases. We have never assigned cases to a certain Judge? How will I do the reporting from March to September and how will I move forward to assign a certain case to a Judge? I don't know how to separate them?	It would get counted under the court that originally got the filing.
Transfers of Guardianship coming into our county, Are they counted as a Probate Cases Filed? And transfers out considered a Disposed?	It is counted as All Other Matters (not a new case). So, if we don't transfer but actually dispose the District case and the Attorney files 1 or more County cases then there would be nothing to report, correct?	correct

If a case is transferred from one district court to another district court within the same county, would it be considered as a transfer or dispose? Also, if it is transferred to another county would it be disposed or transferred?	District to district, same county = transfer Transfer to another county = disposed
