TIDC Board and Committee Meetings

The TIDC Full Board met on December 6 to

consider and approve legislative proposals, approve a grant application related to family protection representation, approve a memorandum of understanding with the Department of Family and Protective Services to improve county access to federal Title IV-E reimbursement funds, received preliminary results from the FY24 Indiger

from the Grants & Reporting Committee and the Policies & Standards Committee. The December meeting was **Presiding Judge Sharon Keller's** last TIDC Board meeting, after 23 years of service to TIDC. TIDC thanks Judge Keller, for her vision, passion, and thousands of hours she gave to TIDC over the years. Indigent defense in Texas is much better thanks to her dedication. After the meeting, current and form TIDC staff, Board members, and friends celebrated Judge Keller's years of service to the Commission with a reception and <u>video</u>.

In January, TIDC welcomed three new board members, the **Honorable Jimmy Blacklock**, Chief Justice, Supreme Court of Texas, the **Honorable David Schenck**, Presiding Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, and **Representative John Smithee**, Chairman, House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee.

The <u>TIDC Full Board</u> met April 4 to discuss TIDC at the legislature, Operation Lone Star, and for updates from the Grants, Policy, Family Protection Representation, and Improvement

teams. At the meeting, TIDC reconfigured the Board's committees. The Policies & Standards Committee members are **James Bethke**, **Valerie Covey**, **Richard Evans**, and the committee is chaired by **Alex Bunin**. **J.R. Woolley** is a member of the Grants & Reporting Committee, chaired by **Emily Miskel**, and has a vacant position that will be filled at the upcoming June meeting.

The next TIDC Full Board meeting will be on June 27, 2025 in Austin.

TIDC at the Texas Legislature

Following is a summary of major legislation impacting TIDC, indigent defense, and family protection representation; staff testimony; and other TIDC activities at the Legislature:

TIDC Budget—Based on the conference committee report to <u>SB 1</u> and <u>HB 500</u>, the Supplemental Appropriations bill (as passed by the House and Senate), TIDC's FY26-27 budget includes:

- **Total Budget**: \$165,240,414 total appropriation for FY26-27, \$41 million of which is for Operation Lone Star (OLS) representation.
- Unspent OLS Funds for Non-OLS Purposes: Budget rider providing Unexpended Budget (UB) authority to spend up to \$10 million in unexpended OLS funds in FY26-27

on "programs in rural counties, created on or before September 1, 2025 ... for programs with one-time expenses or temporary assistance."

- No Funds for OLS Public Defender Office Appeals: A budget rider prohibits TIDC from using funds "for grants to public defender offices related to Operation Lone Star ... to fund appellate proceedings."
- Wharton & Matagorda Public Defender: Budget rider directing TIDC to fully fund a public defender office for Wharton and Matagorda Counties for the first year of the program and two-thirds of eligible costs in subsequent years.
- **Terrell & Val Verde Public Defender**: Budget rider directing TIDC to use \$1 million to establish and operate a public defender office in Terrell and Val Verde Counties.
- <u>HB 500</u>: Supplemental appropriation of \$5.1 million to make up for TIDC's budget shortfall in the FY24-25 biennium.

Other Legislation and Resolutions

- <u>SB 2111</u> (Zaffirini/Moody), TIDC's omnibus bill passed both chambers and was sent to the Governor on May 27.
- <u>SB 1838</u> (Zaffirini/Moody), TIDC's family representation fee schedule bill has passed both chambers as of May 27.

TIDC partnered with the Office of Court Administration to collect interpreter expense data as part of the IDER, which is required by 2023 legislation.
